UPDATE ON ALLIED HEALTH/HEALTH SCIENCES

We've got a couple of big changes coming to the Allied Health division:

- First, you may have read that the Allied Health division will be renamed **Health Sciences** as of July 1. The new name came about after discussion with some Allied Health faculty and staff about the future of the division – and fun fact: The term "Allied Health" does not typically encompass nursing, which is obviously a big part of OTC. We decided that it's time for an updated name that reflects the full array of healthcare education we offer.
- Also, Dr. Sherry Taylor will retire on March 31 as Dean of Allied Health. We will plan to celebrate with a masked, socially-distant retirement reception for Dr. Taylor sometime this spring. So in addition to the name change, we'll be posting soon for a Dean of Health Sciences to fill the vacancy Dr. Taylor leaves behind.

CONDENSED/COMPRESSED TERMS

I had the pleasure of visiting with Faculty Senate last week, and one of the topics was an update on OTC's move to more A- and B-block courses. For those new to the conversation, research indicates that students experience greater success in courses that are offered in a more concentrated time frame. A task force will be formed soon to study this topic and the factors affecting implementation of a more robust schedule of A- and B-block offerings at OTC.

You will notice that A-block results are generally higher than any other term length, but that results may dip with B-block. There are a couple of possible reasons for this: 1) B-block courses are likely to be taken along with other term-length courses, which defeats the purpose of students being able to focus on a limited number of subjects at a time, and 2) enrollments in B-block classes are more likely to be students who initially attempted a 16 week course then dropped, rather than an intentional choice.
