Another Example of a Culture of Care: If you've ever had an experience with the Carol Jones Writing Center, you know what a great resource it is for students and faculty alike. As we talk more about deepening our commitment to a culture of caring at OTC, I'd like to highlight the CJWC and their approach to helping students. Dr. David Ball directs the CJWC, and he shared with me a message he recently sent to the tutors. He's given me permission to share an excerpt here:

The main thing is to keep the main thing the main thing. The main thing is the mission: We help people negotiate the process off solving problems through the act of writing. Everything else is just details. If the student is on the spectrum, that is just a detail. If the person is deaf, that is just a detail. If the person is totally stressed out over something that seems like it ought not to be such a calamity, that is just a detail. If the person is a parent with a child in tow, that is just a detail. If the person does not exhibit an adult's understanding of proper social protocols, that is just a detail. We help them. Wherever they are. With as much grace as we can muster. Even if it's tricky or vexing. I mentioned this in training this week: tutoring is as much about reading the person as it is about reading the text. They are wherever they are. They know whatever they know. They do not know whatever they do not know. That's just details. We creatively and empathetically meet them where they are and help them go where they need to go. How do we do that? The best we can.

Although Dr. Ball's audience is the CJWC tutors, what a powerful reminder this is for all of us. The main thing is to fulfill our mission which is, "...to provide accessible, high quality and affordable learning opportunities that transform lives and strengthen the communities we serve." Everything else is just details. We serve the students we have, not the students we want. They've come to us because we've told them this is the place where you can transform your life, so let's keep that in mind when they come to us with a life that needs to be transformed. How do we do that? As Dr. Ball says, "The best we can."

I am honored every day to work alongside each of you. You bring your best to your students even when it's hard. You are appreciated.
