Final Grades – **Final grades are due no later than 10 a.m. on Monday, December 20.** *Please meet this deadline*. I can't emphasize the importance of this enough. When final grades are submitted late, it slows down many other processes that must take place in Student Affairs before they can begin their Winter Break. Our colleagues in Student Affairs do a great job of supporting Academic Affairs all year long, and this is the least we can do to honor their efforts.

Care-Full Teaching: A reminder that the Center for Academic Innovation (CAI) will be offering a third faculty training course "Care-full Teaching" as a follow-up to "Preparing to Pivot" and "Delivering Flexible Courses." Topics include equity, flexibility, integrating institutional supports, self-care, inclusive and accessible practices, effective communication, syllabus, assessment, and more. This course is being supported with HEERF funding, and faculty that successfully complete the course by the deadline will receive a \$200 stipend. The course is optional. There are some eligibility requirements for participants, but instructors who meet those requirements will be automatically enrolled in the course by December 18. The course will run December 20, 2021-January 14, 2022, is self-paced in Canvas, and staff will be available to assist you over the break.
