Once again, COVID-19 has thrown a wrench into our gears – especially related to local school districts who have closed or moved to remote instruction – but we are moving forward and adapting as best as we can. A few other items of note:

Call for Mobile Food Pantry Volunteers: For those of you who are in the Springfield vicinity, I encourage you to volunteer some time to the Crosslines at OTC Mobile Food Pantry this spring. We have expanded the number of students we are serving (over 150 during the last event in December). This is such an important service we provide to our food-insecure students, but it takes a lot of people to make it work. You may <u>sign up here</u>.

Second Chance Pell Update: In 2020, OTC was selected as a site for the Second Chance Pell experiment through the US Department of Education. This initiative awards Pell grants to incarcerated individuals, enabling them to access higher education so they are better prepared for work or additional education after their release. In this initial phase, OTC has partnered with the Ozark Correctional Center in Fordland. This spring, we limited our class sizes to 10 students (though many more than that applied), and we are offering four online courses in 8-week blocks. Due to several Department of Corrections restrictions, developing and delivering courses for this population is challenging, so I want to thank the four faculty members who have stepped up and volunteered to be part of this initiative:

- Dr. John Gambon, Psychology

I also want to thank Jordan Schreiber, OTC's Director of Student Recruitment. Jordan has developed strong relationships with the OCC staff and students, and has truly gone above and beyond to ensure a good experience for the students there, traveling back and forth to Fordland (sometimes making two trips a day). She has also kept the project moving along internally as well. You may recall that Jordan and her team were awarded one of the first Game Changer Grants in 2020 – a former felon support initiative. She is a passionate advocate for this population of students, and we are fortunate

to have her quiet and steady competence leading this effort.
