MCCA Webinar Series - My Favorite Lecture: As OTC's population of students with autism has grown, many of you have sought to educate yourselves about how to better serve them. Ukraine: As Dr. Higdon acknowledged in his *Notes* yesterday, the invasion of Ukraine is weighing heavily on everyone's mind. I know this is causing many of us to feel additional stress and worry, which is only heightened by feelings of helplessness to do anything about it. It has been inspiring to watch Ukrainian President Zelenskyy refuse to leave his people behind. Many of you have likely seen reports of his refusal of the United States' offer to evacuate him. In response, Zelenskyy said, "The fight is here; I need ammunition, not a ride." Though the comparison of Zelenskyy's situation to ours may seem silly, I think most of us can relate: We don't need someone to rescue us, but rather someone to help us fight.

I'm grateful to have such a community at OTC. Many of us are privileged to have trusted colleagues nearby who we can count on for support. Mister Rogers always told us to "look for the helpers," but at some point, the helpers need help, too. The past two years have been brutal, and I'm proud of the way we have been "the helpers" to our students and one another. Through it all, I hope you have known that you are not alone.
