His instructors both submitted OTC Cares report, and our Behavioral Intervention Team (BIT) at OTC was able to reach out and ensure the student was safe and had a connection to helpful resources. Unfortunately, this type of report is common, and we've become somewhat numb to them.

But take a step back and see what is really happening here:

Two instructors created a space welcoming enough that a student felt safe being vulnerable with them. That's big. As I frequently say, the subject matter is important, but relationships matter more. Learning happens best when these two things co-exist.

- Two instructors cared enough to act on this information and reach out for support by filing OTC Cares reports.
- Our BIT collaborated and connected to ensure the student was safe. If nothing else, this student knows that there are people in the world who care about him.

At MCCA, I attended the presentation by political science instructor Andrew Crocker, and physics instructor Jared Durden, the hosts of the "Oh, That's Cool!" podcast. In their session, they explained that their podcast is a way to connect OTC and build community. They have accomplished these goals in spades. Their presentation emphasized that we work *best* when we work *together*. We are most effective when we demonstrate care. When we collaborate. When we support one another. I am grateful that is the type of community we have built here for our students and for each other.
