Generative Artificial Intelligence (GenAI) at OTC: Ever since ChatGPT entered the chat about 18 months ago, there has been increasing interest in the intersection of GenAI and education. The OTC AI Advisory Group, led by Dr. Julie Coltharp and Eric Kyle, has created a survey to better understand OTC employees' and students' current and future preferred use of GenAI both individually and in their work. This week, you and your students will receive a request to complete this survey. Please take a few moments to participate and encourage your students to do the same. Your feedback and insights will help shape OTC's approach to GenAI.

If you're like me and have noticed an increase in student work seemingly created by GenAl, this is a perfect opportunity to engage in discussion and share insights and approaches with colleagues.

**Year-Round Registration:** In his *Notes*, Dr. Higdon mentioned that I have been bragging about all the hard work our staff and faculty have done to make year-round registration possible. I had the opportunity brag some more at the MCCA Chief Academic Officers meeting last week. My counterparts from around the state are keenly interested in what we're doing. They had lots of questions and were intrigued by the possibility of allowing students to register for summer, fall, and spring semesters at the same time. I wouldn't be one bit surprised to see other colleges shift their practices to embrace this model in the coming months.

OTC Student Commencement Speaker: Late last week, Robert-Thomas Gumersell was announced as the student speaker for Commencement this year. I became acquainted with R.T. initially through his involvement in Phi Theta Kappa, and now this semester, he is a
