Yet as the seeds will grow, the waves evermore, and the eternal circle rounds


I will sit and contemplate in connected minds alike What can all harm's do for anything Except watch and watch As the world will always turn.

Welcome To The Universe



Food Recipe: Student Recommendations



Massaman Curry

Ingredients:

2 tablespoons vegetable oil 3 tablespoons curry paste 1 (3/4 inch thick) slice ginger, minced

1 1/4 pounds skinless, boneless chicken

breast meat - cubed

3 tablespoons brown sugar

- 3 tablespoons fish sauce
- 3 tablespoons tamarind paste
- 3 tablespoons cup peanut butter
- 3 cubed peeled potatoes
- 1 (13.5 ounce) can coconut milk
- 3 tablespoons fresh lime juice

Directions:

Heat vegetable oil in a large saucepan over medium heat. Stir in curry paste and minced ginger; cook and stir for 2 minutes. Stir in the cubed chicken, and cook until the pieces turn white on the outside, about 3 minutes.

Stir in brown sugar, fish sauce, tamarind paste, peanut butter, potatoes, and coconut milk. Bring to a boil, then reduce heat to medium-low, cover, and simmer until the potatoes are tender and the chicken pieces are no longer pink in the center, about 20 minutes. Add the lime juice and cook for an additional 5 minutes before serving.

Serve with steamed or fried rice


Karai Ramen + Handroll

CBCO Blood Drive

On September 13th the honors program coordinated with PTK and hosted the first blood drive of the academic year.

We invited the community blood center of the Ozarks (CBCO) to the campus for the blood collection. CBCO supply blood to the local community (43 hospitals located in Southwest Missouri, Northwest Arkansas and Southeast Kansas) as well as the military. They were established in 1995 with one simple mission: "To provide a quality blood supply, in a timely manner, at the lowest reasonable fee, while remaining accountable to the local community, blood donors and health care providers."

They alone need nearly 60,000 units of blood a year. But did you know that in the United States nearly 36,000 units of red blood cells are needed a day?! With someone needing blood on average every 2 seconds! This means any donations can and will save a life!


With this blood drive, our goal was 35 pints. We collected 50! We could have taken more as we had over 80 people registered however time and bed restraints meant we ended up having to turn people away.

We are very thankful to everyone who donated and also those that volunteered to help, from sign ups to ensuring the donors were feeling ok! Everything helped.

What's in the Stars?




September 1st, This is a view of the West-Southwestern Sky. Venus is located of the lowermost tip of the Virgo constellation a finger width away from its alpha star Spico.



September 13th: Jupiter takes the stage conight, Looking into the sky through binoculars about 4 finger widths to the left of the new present moon you can see Jupiter within the constellation Libra



September 7th Do this night we were able to see Neptone fixed directly opposite of the sun, AND it was visible all night via telescope or binoculars.



September 22^{ad}: At 9:54pm EDT the Earth will cross the colestial equator moving southward signifying the transition into the autumnal equinox. On this day, the day and night will be at equal length


