
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### **DIRECTOR'S NOTE**

# COMMUNITY PARTNERSHIP OF THE OZARKS

The Community Partnership of the Ozarks has been serving the Springfield area for over 27 years. This organization provides many invaluable resources to people in need, such as affordable housing and homelessness prevention, community and Neighborhood Development, Early Childhood and Family Development, and Prevention and Youth Support. They have been pivotal in the lives of many, helping tens of thousands of people from all walks of life here in the Ozarks. Just last year, sixty-eight thousand three hundred and thirteen (68,313) people were helped through many Community Partnership campaigns and programs. According to their website, over 9596 volunteers contributed 35,895 hours during that same amount of time.

One Door is one of the Community Partnership programs that aids the ones facing or experiencing homelessness. The program describes itself as a "central point of entry for entry for coordinated intake, assessment and referrals for housing and shelter services." A Shelter Diversion program is also growing under the umbrella of One Door. If you're facing homelessness, One Door agents will meet with you if you call them at 417-225-7499 or show up at the O'Reilly Center for Hope at 1518 East Dale Street. The agents can help you identify resources, options, and opportunities that could help your situation.

This is true for many other Community Partnership programs, as they are a hub of community resources and information for the common good. If you want to get involved in their cause, there are many opportunities for internships and permanent positions within the CPO.
