APPLICATION DEADLINE:

The Medical Laboratory Technician Program is a selective admission program and admission is determined by a points-based system. Points are awarded on academic preparedness and references.

Complete the OTC admissions process.

an applicant may not be considered for the program. Please email healthsciences@otc.edu to request additional information.)
Official transcripts from accredited schools attended other than OTC must be received before the
application deadline.
Submit a Medical Laboratory Technician application using the online application portal apply.otc.edu by the
application deadline (February 15).
Provide 3 professional references during the online application process by the deadline . Select individuals
who are able to comment on your academic potential, work performance or potential to function in a
health care field.

INTERVIEW PROCESS:

- Applicants who have met all of the requirements are considered for an interview.
- Emails regarding the date, time, and location of the interview are sent out approximately two weeks in advance. Please notify Health Sciences of any change in name, email address, or phone number.
- The interview is approximately 15 minutes in length. The applicant is asked questions by a group of interviewers.

NOTIFICATION OF ACCEPTANCE:

• Based upon the program's admission scoring system, the top 20 applicants will be offered a position in the program and will receive information on the necessary steps to complete the program admission.

- Information regarding acceptance or non-acceptance into the program will be delivered to students via the online application portal.
- The accepted students will receive an acceptance packet task list through their OTC email account to complete the admission process.

The Phlebotomy course may be taken in two ways.

- #1 PLB 100 Introduction to Phlebotomy Spring semester, A block
 - PLB 101 Phlebotomy Clinical Spring semester, B block*

*Option One is open to both MLT and non-MLT students.

- > #2 PLB 100 Introduction to Phlebotomy Spring semester, B block
 - PLB 101 Phlebotomy Clinical Summer semester**

PLB 101 is the clinical portion of the course that is required for the ASCP phlebotomy certification exam and entails practice of phlebotomy skills at a clinical facility for a total of 100 hours. This requires four or more hours of availability at least twice a week. PLB 101 is offered during the second block of the spring semester and the summer semester. Phlebotomy is a pre-requisite for the MLT program.

> Graduation from the MLT Program is not contingent upon passing a certification or licensure examination.

OTC cannot guarantee that students classified under the Deferred Action for Childhood Arrivals (DACA) program will receive approval to take the licensure exam after program completion. Please contact the state or national agency that administers the professional licensure exam to inquire about licensure exam requirements.
